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## Executive summary

This report covers the Michigan cottage food framework — the state statute, the regulatory body administering it, what producers can and cannot sell, and county-level rules layered on top of state law for the 83 Michigan counties included in this dataset.

no — Sales through retail stores, restaurants, or wholesale are prohibited. Online sales, mail order, and third-party delivery platform sales (e.g., DoorDash) are allowed in-state only, but require the producer to offer the customer an opportunity to directly interact (face-to-face or virtually) before purchase. A separate \$75,000 cap applies if all products are priced at \$250 or more per item. Honey and maple syrup have a separate exemption permitting indirect retail sales up to \$15,000/year.

### RESEARCH NOTES

Statute text retrieved from the official Michigan Legislature website ([legislature.mi.gov](http://legislature.mi.gov)). The input URL pointed to MCL §289.4101 (the general licensing section); the operative cottage food exemption statute is MCL §289.4102, also retrieved from the same official source. Both the PDF version ([mcl-92-2000-IV.pdf](#) from [legislature.mi.gov](http://legislature.mi.gov)) and the HTML version (MCL-289-4102) were accessed and are consistent. Michigan amended its law in 2025 (HB 4122), doubling the sales cap from \$25,000 to \$50,000 and explicitly allowing online/mail order/third-party delivery platform sales with the face-to-face or virtual interaction requirement. Effective date of 2025 amendment is March 2026 per Forrager. The \$25,000 cap cited in the input notes reflects the pre-2025 law; updated to \$50,000 per the 2025 amendment. The [michigan.gov/mdard](http://michigan.gov/mdard) cottage foods page returned HTTP 403 during crawl but was accessible through search result summaries.

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## Allowed foods

Non-potentially hazardous foods produced in a home kitchen, including baked goods (breads, cookies, cakes, cupcakes, pies, donuts, macarons), candies (chocolate, fudge, brittles, truffles), condiments (honey, nut butters, syrups, vinegars), dry goods (cereals, coffee, dried fruit/vegetables, herbs, pasta, spices, tea), pastries, preserves (jams, jellies, marmalades), and snacks (granola, popcorn, chocolate-covered items, fruit leathers, vegetable chips).

## Prohibited foods

Perishable baked goods, acidified foods, low-acid canned foods, fruit butters, pickles, fermented foods, salsas, sauces, ketchup, mustards, candied apples, confections with alcohol, meat jerkies, juices, carbonated drinks, kombucha, and pet food. Only two specified buttercream frosting recipes are permitted. Sales by consignment or wholesale are prohibited.

## Labeling requirements

Labels must include: business name and address (or name, phone, and registration number); product name; ingredients in descending order by weight; net weight or volume; allergen information per federal requirements; nutritional information if any claim is made; and the statement in at least 11-point font: 'Made in a home kitchen that has not been inspected by the Michigan department of agriculture and rural development.' An optional registration number (from MSU Product Center, one-time fee up to \$50) may replace the home address.

## Statutory text — verbatim excerpt

### Statute excerpt — verbatim

289.4102 Cottage food operation; exemption from licensing and evaluation provisions; requirements. Sec. 4102. (1) A cottage food operation is exempt from the licensing and evaluation provisions of this act. This exemption does not include an exemption from the adulteration and other standards imposed in this section or under this act, or both, and does not limit the ability of the department to take appropriate enforcement action for applicable violations as described in section 5101. This subsection does not require a cottage food operation to meet the standards contained in 21 CFR part 110 or the food code. (2) Cottage food products must be prepackaged and properly labeled before sale. (3) A cottage food operation shall place on the label of any food it produces or packages the following information: (a) The name and address of the business, or name, telephone number, and registration number; (b) The name of the cottage food product; (c) Ingredients in descending order of predominance by weight; (d) Net weight or net volume; (e) Allergen labeling as specified by federal requirements; (g) The following statement printed in at least the equivalent of 11-point font size in a color that provides a clear contrast to the background: "Made in a home kitchen that has not been inspected by the Michigan department of agriculture and rural development." (4) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, a cottage food product must be sold directly from the cottage food operation to the consumer. Sales by consignment or at wholesale are prohibited. A cottage food product may be sold by internet or mail order or may be delivered to a consumer through a third-party food delivery platform if the cottage food operation provides an opportunity for a consumer to directly interact with the cottage food operation before the cottage food product is sold. A cottage food product sold by internet or mail order or delivered through a third-party delivery platform must be sold or delivered only to a consumer in this state.

HOME KITCHEN ALLOWED	yes — Michigan's Cottage Food Law exempts cottage food operations from MDARD licensing and inspection. No separate Wayne County permit is required. Operators must comply with state labeling and food safety standards. Local unit of government rules (city zoning, home occupation ordinances) may still apply. Cities of Detroit, Dearborn, Livonia, and Westland have their own cottage food rules that may differ from county-level.

Sales within Michigan only. Annual gross sales cap: \$50,000 (until Oct 1, 2026, then inflation-adjusted); \$75,000 if unit price \$250+.

### RESEARCH NOTES

Michigan Cottage Food Law is state-administered with no county-level registration required. The 2025 amendment (HB 4122) doubled the cap from \$25,000 to \$50,000 effective October 2025/March 2026. Operators may optionally register with MSU Product Center (one-time fee up to \$50) to receive a registration number for labels instead of home address. Cities of Detroit, Dearborn, Livonia, and Westland may have additional local rules. Wayne County includes Detroit — the largest city in Michigan.

Michigan's Cottage Food Law (MCL §289.4102) is a Great-tier state law: no registration, no inspection, no sales cap at state level, direct sales within Michigan only, no license required from MDARD. Must be primary residence. State law does not preempt local ordinances; operators must check local government rules. In Grand Rapids, Home Occupation licenses exist but are structured for different business types; food production home occupation likely falls under Class A or B (not the Class C lodging license found in search). Kent County townships (Kentwood, Wyoming, Walker, etc.) each have separate zoning codes. Annual sales cap of \$25,000 noted on Kentwood city page — this may be an outdated figure from prior law; current state law has no cap. Confidence medium: state law confirmed from official MDARD page; local zoning details not fully confirmed for Kent County unincorporated areas.

The Wexford Joint Zoning Ordinance of 2017 also defines a separate 'Cottage Industry' category for activities at a greater scale than home occupation.

#### RESEARCH NOTES

Wexford County Zoning Ordinance #5 (adopted 1995, amended 2012) found via energyzoning.org. Sec. 3.2 governs home occupations with clear standards: entirely in dwelling, max 25% floor area, no external evidence, one non-resident employee, one small sign. The Wexford Joint Zoning Ordinance of 2017 defines home occupation as automatic allowed use without permit; cottage industry as a distinct scaled-up category. County seat is Cadillac. State cottage food law allows up to \$50,000 in annual sales from home kitchen.
